Medical seat set to sell for ₹41 lakh

Bengaluru: With the completion of the mop-up round for the National Eligibility and Entrance Test, medical seats in Karnataka will now be transferred to the management quota. As many as 676 medical seats were surrendered to the management quota by the Karnataka Examinations Authority (KEA), and each seat carries an annual fee tag of Rs 21 lakh to Rs 41 lakh.

On Monday night, the KEA released the data on unfilled seats after the mop-up round. Many of the vacant seats are in prominent colleges. For instance, MS Ramaiah Institute has 13 medical seats

vacant; Kempegowda Institute of Medical Sciences has 24 seats; Rajarajeshwari Medical College and Hospital has 42 seats; Khaja Banda Nawaz Institute of Medical Sciences has 20 seats; and JJM Medical College has 47 seats vacant.

The first three institutes

are in Bengaluru, Nawaz college is in Kalaburagi and JJM in Davanagere.

Asked about any fee cap for this pool of seats, medical education director Dr S Sacchidanand said: "The fee structure is decided by colleges and it has doubled in past few years for undergraduate medical courses in private colleges."

During the counselling and mop-up rounds, the annual fee for a medical seat was between Rs 16,700 and Rs 1 lakh, and for a dental seat, it was Rs 14,400 to Rs 1 lakh under the government quota. Fee under private quota was more or less in the same band.

An official from KEA said:
"Our last task (as part of counselling) was to post a list of
vacant seats along with the
fee structure. Until now, students had to pick seats through the KEA. Now, they can
directly approach colleges
and pay fees there. The KEA
has no role to play now."



Medical students rush to cancel admissions in Kerala

Candidates say they cannot mobilise an additional ₹6 lakh in a short period

Dramatic scenes unfolded at the Thiruvananthapuram Government Medical College where registration for the MBBS and BDS admission process was under way on Tuesday.

Confusion and affixiety were writ large on the faces of candidates and guardians who turned up for the process in the aftermath of the Supreme Court judgment that fixed the annual fee for MBBS courses in Kerala's self-financing medical colleges at ₹11 lakh.

'No choice'

Many applicants decided to cancel their allotments owing to their inability to mobilise the required funds. "Despite doing all that we could to obtain a respectable

rank, we are left with nowhere to go. My parents had to knock on several doors to gather ₹5 lakh. There is no way we can mobilise another ₹6 lakh in a short time," said Akshara.

Sajeena from Attingal was inconsolable as she attended the registration process along with her daughter whose rank in the State medical entrance rank list figured in the 2300s. The family, which comes in the below poverty line category, had its hopes pinned on the possibility of benefiting from the scholarship provided by the government to economically disadvantaged students.

"To help my daughter achieve her ambition, we managed a loan of ₹5 lakh from a private lender. We have come to get a refund and return the principal amount," she said.

A group of applicants and parents conducted a demonstration at the venue over the alleged failure of the government to protect their interests. Some floated the idea of approaching the court, considering that they were not represented in the case.
